Study: Fish catch underreported by China: China's fishing fleet reports less than one-tenth of its catch, a study says, leading to the decimation of the fish population, writes John Vidal. "Countries need to realise the importance of accurately recording and reporting their catches and step up to the plate, or there will be no fish left for our children," said Daniel Pauly of the University of British Columbia. Leaders, activists hail "landmark" UN arms treaty: The United Nations General Assembly's passage of the international arms trade treaty on Tuesday is being hailed as "a landmark agreement that will save lives and ease the immense human suffering caused by armed conflict around the world," says British Prime Minister David Cameron. The treaty requires ratification by 50 countries and would take effect three months after that time. Associated Press (4/2)

Cambodian housewives protest forced evictions: Cambodian housewives are using nonviolent protest as a means to counter forced evictions and police retaliation, writes Katherine Brickell. These women are "using their positions as wives and mothers to co-opt riot police through their songs of suffering and to morally shame them when they are publicly beaten," Brickell writes. The Guardian (London) (4/2)

Use of better cookstoves helps preserve Tanzania forests: The use of better cookstoves is lessening demand for firewood, helping preserve forests in the eastern part of Tanzania, writes Lucas Liganga. A plan to replace 1,000 stoves with more efficient models could save 1,716 metric tons of firewood annually, says a development official. AlertNet (3/29)

The Devil Gets His Due

Lectionary Readings for the Week: Psalm 150; John 20:19-31; Acts 5:27-32; Revelation 1:4-8.

Going Off the Rails

In 1980 Ozzy Osbourne released a song called "Crazy Train." The chorus of the song is ridiculously simple, but very evocative: "I'm going off the rails on a crazy train." What the apostles were doing must have seemed like this to much of the surrounding world. The Pharisees and leaders certainly seem to think this. Drawing attention to the public proclamation of Jesus as Lord was indeed crazy. This crazy train, Peter is clear to note, does not have a human conductor, and God is taking it right off of the rails. This is not to condone going off of the rails for its own sake or irresponsible witness to Jesus Christ. Much depends on how one evaluates the rails in the first place. What to the authorities of the time seemed like going off the rails was accurate. But that's because from the perspective of Acts, the current rails on which the human train journeyed were no longer bringing God's forgiveness and renewal, but actually hindering it.
