

#### What's on the Menu?

Lectionary Readings for the Week: Psalm 148; John 13:31-35; Acts 11:1-18; Revelation 21:1-6. (The focus scripture is in bold.)

"Indeed, in a world in which Christianity too often finds itself beset against itself in wars over scriptural authority, denominationalism, separation of church and state, and the like, the advice of the Johannine Jesus continues to be excellent advice – setting aside all our differences, as disciples of Jesus, we are called to *love one another*. In today's culture, such a command can be read as a cry for ecumenism. But, at the same time, in a world in which Christianity finds itself entrenched in the culture rather than beset by it (even in the face of the growing secularism in Western nations), to stop here, looking only inward at ourselves and our churches, would be to miss the point.

The reason for the conflict experienced by John's church was *because* it was a missional church – because it was making itself known and felt in a world hostile to it. In this regard, if not in many others, it was not all that different from Luke's church described in Acts. In other words, the mission of the church, in the various forms and the various circumstances in which it's found itself, has from the beginning been grounded in a vision larger than itself. For John's Jesus, this was showing the world the Light – what it meant to be a follower of Christ. For Luke's Jesus, this was showing the world aid and concern – helping the victims, eating with those different from you, and baptizing whole households, even slaves, women, and children. Being a disciple of Jesus in these circumstances meant loving *into* community the whole people of God – not simply loving those with whom one was already in communion." ### A NOTE FROM PASTOR RICK

After a particularly trying week last week, this week has seemed calmer. Beautiful weather helps, as do the many words of affirmation and hope that people have penned. As followers of Jesus, we are caught up in the very specific challenge to love one another, in particular, our enemies. This is never easy and the closer, more real, more evil our enemies seem, the more difficult the challenge. I want to focus on two of the lectionary texts this week. The first is Jesus "new commandment" as recorded in John 13, to "love one another as I (Jesus) have loved you." That little qualifier at the end of the sentence throws the challenge of love into an entirely different dimension. We know something of love from our individual collective experiences, but to love as Jesus loved? With the same compassion, forgiveness, grace? That is going to take some work!

I see the story of Peter and Cornelius, as recounted in Acts 11, as a very specific illustration of what "loving as Jesus loved" might look like. Peter is challenged to grow far beyond his comfort zone in the service of a God who is much more inclusive than Peter had ever imagined. "You just keep bringing the good news, Peter. God will make sure there is room at the table for everyone who hears and desires to join in the feast."

We also have the privilege of having Robert Wilkins with us Sunday to share an update on the American Baptist Seminary of the West. Robert, who heads the YMCA of the East Bay is a delightful person. I hope you will all stay to hear him in the Adult Spiritual Formation hour.

See you on Sunday at 10 as we as we gather as Christ's beloved community. Invite someone to come with you.

May God's new thing flourish within us and among us.
