EU allows arms shipments to rebels; Syria peace talks remain uncertain: The EU will not renew a ban on arms shipments to Syrian rebel groups, though no member countries have announced plans to supply the opposition, which is having difficulty coalescing ahead of upcoming peace talks. <u>The Washington Post</u> (5/27)

Ban commends Rwanda for its "brave recovery": United Nations Secretary-General Ban Kimoon visited Rwanda this week, lauding the country for its recovery from the 1994 genocide that killed over 1 million people. "You are writing a different future. ... In less than two decades, you have reconciled and rebuilt. You stand as an example of humanity's capacity for human compassion and forgiveness," Ban said. Amnesty: Refugees find quest for safety to be elusive: Refugees and asylum-seekers are seeking safety and security but instead are being met with abuses, says a report from Amnesty International. "The rights of those fleeing conflict are unprotected. Too many governments are abusing human rights in the name of immigration control -- going well beyond legitimate border control measures," says Amnesty Secretary-General Salil Shetty. Feast of the Visitation

"Story = Grace"

Reading for the Week: Luke 1:39-57.

Cathleen Falsani says, "Sacred friendship is grace, holding space for one another as Mary and Elizabeth did, John and Jesus did." To be a soul friend (anam cara) may be a calling for all Christians. To be friends with Jesus is to have and be a soul friend.

"Mary, as the gospel of Luke goes on, clearly is open to the word...[still] it is my sense that her yes was unsure and that it was out of mercy and kindness that the angel Gabriel before flitting off said: Oh, by the way, your kinswoman, Elizabeth, great in age and barren, is about the have a child, and she is in her sixth month. The subtext was: Maybe you should go to see her. Indeed, we are told in the gospel that Mary rushed in haste to be with Elizabeth. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child in her womb leapt, and Elizabeth, filled with the Holy Spirit, cried out: "Blessed are you among woman and blessed is the fruit of your womb." Blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfillment of what was spoken to her by the Lord" (Luke 1:42).

Hearing those words Mary said, I do believe, and a deeper surrender occurred at that moment. Out of that more complete yes, provoked by the very human encounter with her kinswoman Elizabeth, Mary was able to sing: "My soul magnifies the Lord, my spirit rejoices in God my Savior" (Luke 1:46). The meeting of Mary and Elizabeth teaches us that as the personal identifying word finds a home in us or draws us out of some place of safety and protection into the wildness of God's own desire and imagination. We need human friends who are companions along the way. They are not always friends, for sometimes critics speak the word more deeply than friends -- but they are fellow travelers. They show up to confirm the word we think we are hearing, which invites us to a deeper fidelity." (Frank T. Griswold, "Listening with the Ear of the Heart," *Cross Currents*, www.aril.org.)
