

American Baptist Foreign Mission Society (operating as International Ministries (IM) began its pioneer mission work approximately 200 years ago in Burma and today works in Asia, Africa, Europe, the Middle East, and the Americas. More than 100 full-time missionaries along with short-term missionaries and mission partners serve in more than 70 countries. Its central mission is to help people **come** to faith in Jesus, **grow** in

# IN THE WORLD

**DAN BUTTRY, IM PEACE ADVOCATE ON THE ROAD**: In November 2012 Dan led a training session in Chiang Mai, Thailand for 24 people from 8 countries in Asia and the Pacific. "That was one of the greatest training experiences I've ever had -- an incredible high-functioning group!" he said.

Nancy and Steve James, missionaries in Haiti, had heard about Dan Buttry's earlier efforts to empower Christian leaders in the Naga Hills, Northeast India to resolve their problems peacefully.

They felt his skills could help groups and individuals in Haiti as well. Pastor Emmanuel Pierre invited Dan to the Haiti Pastors' Conference where he led a 3-hour workshop introducing the concept of conflict resolution and how it can be a positive and effective method of resolving problems. They appreciated his interactive style and the new ways of dialogue and listening and they plan for more teaching and training. "We are excited about what God might be doing in Haiti", Nancy James said.

Recently, Dan was back in Kenya for the fourth time in 3 years! This year, on September 13, Sharon Buttry joined her husband in a 10-day Intensive Training of Conflict Transformation Trainers with 32 key Christian peacemakers from 7 African countries in Nairobi on how to facilitate training of the principles and skills of conflict transformation using experiential education methodologies. Leaders from Angola, Burundi, Liberia, Uganda, Nigeria, Zimbabwe, and Kenya along with some Central Seminary, Kansas City students were involved in training that they said was "transforming their lives".

Sharon has been endorsed by International Ministries to become a part-time missionary, as a Global Consultant for Community Transformation, spending 2-3 months/year teaching and doing community work abroad with Dan.

### **WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY**

"We've a Story to Tell"

Lectionary reading for the Week: Psalm 137; Lamentations 1:1-6, 3:19-26; Luke 17:5-10; **2 TIMOTHY 1:1-14**. (Focus scripture for this week is in bold.)

The Epistle reading is a love letter from an older sage to young Timothy. He is truly the beloved follower of the author (identified as the Apostle Paul). Paul gives thanks for the faith of Timothy's mother and grandmother, who have been this young man's models in discipleship. He reminds the young man that the faith of Christ must be rekindled and from that burst of fire new energies emerge. The laying on of hands conveys God's presence in ways that renew our spirits and give us power to be God's agents of creative transformation.

Paul is able to face his sufferings because of his faith in Christ. He knows that whether he lives or dies, he belongs to God. God's vision of salvation in Christ nurtures and sustains him and enables him to face suffering with hope.

Paul's words are highly countercultural today. Christians in North America seldom suffer for our faith. Our churches receive non-profit status and pastors receive tax benefits. This text asks us: For what are we willing to suffer to be faithful to the way of Jesus? Where might we trust God and place ourselves in the position to suffer for the Gospel?

These passages point to the importance of living in the spirit of Jesus and aiming high in our faith journeys. Aiming low leads to personal and social destruction. In contrast, a life of faithful discipleship creates circles of well-being that transform families, communities, and nations. ## A NOTE FROM PASTOR RICK

This month of October begins something of a journey outward as we celebrate World Communion Sunday and take our annual World Mission Offering. Sunday you are invited to wear something from your native country or a country you have visited as we acknowledge our common bond with Christians all around the world. The music, liturgy and décor will reflect this multicultural emphasis. And it is particularly significant for us as we continue to claim our identity as a multicultural congregation.

The World Mission Offering not only supports the work of the American Baptist Board of International Ministries as a whole, we also share the money raised between our two special interest missionaries. Dan and Sarah Chetti do remarkable work both in the Arab Theological Seminary in Beirut and in ministry to the women who are brought to Lebanon to serve as domestic workers. Dan (and now Sharon) Buttry travel all over the world, planting and nurturing the seeds of peace in conflict-ridden situations. (See a summary of their recent work above under "In the World.")

The worship focus for Sunday is taken from an old hymn we used to sing, "We've a Story to Tell to the Nations." I assume we have stopped singing that hymn because of its overtones of an arrogant kind of Christianity that many of us have struggled to let go of and leave behind. Modern missionaries very much see themselves as partners with those they serve. The wisdom of the West is not automatically superior to the rich resources and traditions of people from other parts of the world. Still, when Ann and Adoniram Judson left Massachusetts in 1813, headed for the Indian subcontinent, they believed with all their hearts they had a story to tell. What was the essence of that story for which they were willing to risk their lives? Do we have a story to tell today? What is it? How do we share it? What, if anything, are we willing to risk for it?

Please join us at 10:00 AM on Sunday. Bring along a family member, friend, colleague, neighbor or stranger to share in worship; then, stay for Adult Spiritual Formation when Pastor Tripp will lead us in the second of a series, this week featuring a video of Brian McLaren and a discussion of the question, "If you ask me, 'Is God real?' I first have to ask you, 'Which God are we talking about?'"
