MIXON MUSES

"June is bustin' out all over." In the midst of a heat wave, windows are open to catch any little breeze, everything is green and blooming, allergies are operating full throttle, and we've entered, post Pentecost, that long, lazy season in the liturgical life of the church called Ordinary Time. Ordinary though it may be, we still have some excitement on the horizon. The first Sunday of this month we will be privileged by the presence of Cathleen Falsani, sharing with us some mutual experiences of grace. "Story = Grace" is our theme. This is the culmination of a month-long study of her excellent book, *Sin Boldly: A Field Guide to Grace.* I commend it you as ideal summer reading. One of the key things Cathleen says in her book is this: "Justice is getting what you deserve. Mercy is not getting what you deserve. And grace is getting what you absolutely don't deserve. Benign goodwill. Unprovoked compassion. The unearnable gift."

"Amazing grace! How sweet the sound..." Indeed, it is a sweet sound, sometimes a sound too sweet for our very pragmatic understanding. We all know that salvation can't be earned but do we really believe it? Do we grasp how thoroughly God loves and accepts us with whatever our limitations and failures? It's often a struggle to let grace enfold us, to feel its warmth, to bask in its light, to let its healing wash over us, making us whole. So we fail to see that amazing grace is around and within us in the simplest beauties and wonders of daily life – the tree, the flower, the breeze that blows, the stream that flows, the warm smile, the helping hand, the love that forms and sustains friendship and builds community.

Later this month, I will represent us at the inaugural session of a new phase in American Baptist life. The biennial meeting will no longer be a business meeting for the denomination. It is now called a Mission Summit and is designed to inspire and build up the missional life of the ABC-USA. This is an interesting ex-

periment in a way to do church at a denominational level that will enable all American Baptists to work together in the service of God. I am very pleased that Don Ng, the distinguished pastor of First Chinese Baptist Church in San Francisco, is the nominee for President of the ABC-USA and is taking a key leadership role in this effort at denominational transformation. Don is an old friend whose vision and judgment I trust deeply.

It is interesting that this Mission Summit (and the next, in 2015) will be held in Overland Park, Kansas, a place where I lived from 1950 to 1953. Some of my earliest memories are of those days when my father was the founding pastor of Prairie Baptist Church in Prairie Village, Kansas. So, this represents a kind of homecoming for me. I hope to attend that church on Sunday morning of the Biennial. In addition, I will attend the pre-biennial theology conference at Central Baptist Seminary (the school from which my father earned 3 degrees,) led by our friend, Jennifer Davidson, from ABSW. Then I will stay for the board meetings of the Association of Welcoming Baptists. It will be a full and, I trust, rich week. Wally Bryen will preach on June 23 in my absence.

What else can we say about June? There will be an intergenerational cookout and time for volleyball and visiting on Friday, June 14, in honor of Father's Day. The church choir will end its season on June 16. Adult Spiritual Formation for June will include our Sunday with Cathleen Falsani; a follow-up on our Sunday with her and our study of her book on June 9; some reflection on *The Awakened Heart: Opening Yourself to the Love You Need* by Gerald May, one of the books from my spiritual direction program; and a last go for the season at "The Newspaper in One Hand...an occasional discussion of what's happening in the world in light of the gospel."

And there will be singing. Jan reminds us that The Bay Choral Guild, the group with which she sings will be performing in our sanctuary on Sunday, June 9 at 4:30 PM. The concert is entitled "Our American Heritage" and will feature music from colonial days to the present. You won't want to miss the wonderful opportunity right here in our building. And if you're feeling a little more ad-

venturesome, The Choral Project, the group in which Dan Cudworth, Ruth Winter (who is helping us out in the church choir through June) and I all sing will be presenting concerts in Santa Clara and Santa Cruz on June 8 and 9. Our concerts, entitled "Earthsongs" will cover a cross section of music from the classical to world music to pop music. It will be a fun event as well. More detailed information is available for both groups is available elsewhere in the Spire.

Which brings us back to grace. For me there is no more open door to grace than in the experience of music – heard and performed. I thank God for all the amazing music that has graced my life and, I hope, yours as well. May our lives flow on in endless song and may the God of grace author the music of all our days.



PIGS FOR KIDS IN HAITI PROJECT

In January our children/youth sponsored the Mission Offering which totaled \$1,602. This was sent to International Ministries of ABC-USA, and then on to our missionaries in Haiti. We now have received a letter from Nzunga Mabudiga to our church, dated May 11:

Greeting from Haiti! As I promised you, I traveled to Gros Morne, about 5 hours' drive from our city of Cap-Haiti, to be and to worship with our people there. Gros Morne is in the desert-like kind of nature. Water is hard to find specially during the dry times. At this time of year, they produce plenty of mangos which become a source of income for many families. Since they have mangos, they are not interested in selling pigs and pigs become rare and expensive.

We did manage to find and buy 20 pigs and one was stolen after a few days.

Families and specially children who have received those pigs are very happy to have them. We always share them after our Sunday service after we have prayed for them and the families of the children receiving the pigs. The whole church becomes the witness of what the love of Christ is doing in the world.

Please be our voice to the children to let them know that their money is well appreciated and it has not gone in vain. We have children who are being blessed by their love and their support.

FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH Council Meeting Minutes, May 23, 2013

Moderator Carolyn Shepard opened the meeting at 5:04 PM.

Present: Dan Cudworth, Jane and Jin Chin, Marilyn Hunwick, Pastor Rick Mixon, Eleanor and Hugh Satterlee, and Moderator Carolyn Shepard.

Pastor Rick read a brief item from a piece by Mathew Haumann noting that mission can be thought of as dialogue - is sharing, and that the Holy Spirit should be the guide.

Rick noted that Pastor Tripp is in the final throes of paper writing and assembling his comprehensives for review. It has now been firmed up that Tripp will spend three Sundays per month during the next school year at our church and the other at a Berkeley Episcopal church. His thesis will compare and contrast approaches to worship at that church, a Roman Catholic Church in Berkeley and our church. Rick and Tripp will meet on June 7th with the two interns, Naomi Schultz and Doug Davidson, to put plans on the calendar for the school year beginning in September 2013.

Those noted with current health problems included Eileen Conover, Bob Towner, and Joanne Jones.

Coverage for managing the fellowship time following church was discussed. Eleanor will prepare a list of supplies with locations to help those helping out. June fellowship time will continue in the narthex. Patio Hour will begin in July. The Congregation Life Team will offer support.

The subject of church office hours was discussed. Members are reminded that the office is open from 1:00 to 5:30 PM Tuesday through Friday. Rick's phone numbers are listed in the church directory for emergencies.

The Council voted to establish a volunteer IRA for church employees who work 15 hours or more per week. Details of this are in the Resolution, made a part of these minutes and available in the church office. Hugh moved to adopt the resolution and Marilyn seconded.

The Council voted, with Jane moving and Eleanor seconding, to award the cash donation to Oleta agreed to at the last Council meeting as a, "direct, non-insured, payment of medical expenses."

Jin reviewed the Treasurer's Report. Total income is behind schedule at this point, but pre-pledges and lower spending for expenses at this point have preserved a positive bank balance. No funds have been drawn from Special Funds.

Jane reviewed the Finance report. The Annex Committee met with an attorney to review changes in documentation offered by the Palo Alto Community Child Care. A few minor changes resulted and these are being reviewed by the PACCC. A short delay in closing will result.

Jane reported that the earnings of the Lundquist Fund available for use has grown to about \$48,000 because of the rising stock market.

Task Teams: Patio: Rick continues discussion with a contractor regarding the patio. The all-up price of over \$100,000 is discouraging, but the project can be segmented and completed in increments.

Sound System: Chip Clark and Rick have met with a sound specialist who has prepared a list of possible changes totaling \$24,000. This, too, can be segmented. Discussions will proceed.

Renewal: The concept for a plant of an Asian congregation from one of the larger Asian-American churches will be difficult. The effort on the part of the churches which might sponsor this effort seems currently a little much. Other ideas were discussed.

Mission: Marilyn showed photos of Haitian children tending some of the black pigs purchased with funds from the January Fellowship Offering. Funds remain and more piglets are being sought for purchase.

Rick reviewed current and ongoing planning for joint summer services with the Covenant Presbyterian Church.

The next Council meeting will be held on Thursday, June 13th, at 5:00 PM. The second Quarterly Business meeting is scheduled for August 11, 2013.

Carolyn closed the meeting with a short prayer at 7:27 PM.

PRAY FOR CARLOS BONILLA AND MAYRA GIOVANETTI, HELPING TRAIN LEADERS AND SHOWING THE REALITY OF GOD'S LOVE AND MERCY IN NICARAGUA.

Carlos and Mayra are working with the Baptist Theological Seminary in Nicaragua, accompanying them in the program of informal theological education in the churches of the Baptist Convention of Nicaragua and as writers of curriculum material for the Seminary. They seek each day to show others God's love and mercy, as a reality. They write: [Recently] we celebrated the Baptist Theological Seminary's 72nd anniversary. We are three years from their diamond anniversary in 2016... God is good, God is faithful. From the very beginning, in 1941, God has been the solid Rock on which the Seminary stands. What a delight to hear Jerjes share of the three different phases the Seminary has lived and how it has stood as a beacon in the midst of challenges and as an anchor of hope for a wide community. The Seminary has stood the test of earthquakes, physically and spiritually. It has distinguished itself as a quarry of servants who are thinkers as well as doers.

At different times throughout the thanksgiving service, their appreciation for the contributions of American Baptists was shared with those in attendance. As we stand in a cloud of witnesses before us, we can only humbly pray to be obedient and faithful to God's call to us for this time in serving through the Seminary in Nicaragua. This is a Seminary that has Baptist origins and principles while serving other families of faith (i.e. denominations) that also prepare their servants.

Carlos shared the Word, reflecting on 1 Peter 2:9-10, and we could see the Seminary's relevance and how important what it does. Each seminarian that comes to the main center in Managua, as well as those attending the satellite centers throughout the country, are precious stones in God's hands to be polished into the gem God intends for His service. Granted watching movies about diamonds such as Flawless or Blood Diamond, one would rather not have diamonds in our hands. Yet, as we read the Scriptures, we feel blessed to have been trusted these sisters and brothers to be polished in God's precious diamonds, bought by His blood to shine His light through as His servants. And, oh, how God uses them to polish us in the process as well...

Each community we visit and accompany is a testimony of God's presence in this land. In each rural setting, we are challenged to providing the same education of excellence whether they read and write or not. We are learning so much with them as the Lord is leading us in preparing these curriculum materials. Three years will go by quickly and we trust that when we reach that diamond anniversary, many of these seminarians will be better equipped to serve in the communities they're inserted. And God knows we shall be polished as well... Only to bring many more to God's kingdom to enjoy His love and care.

One Great Hour of Sharing: Our June Mission Offering

The month of June marks the time for our annual giving to One Great Hour of Sharing. "In 2011 we began the 3-year 'Sharing Brings Joy' theme for the One Great Hour of Sharing offering. During 2011 we explored how sharing blesses, transforms, and brings joy to the giver. In 2012, we explored how sharing blesses, transforms, and brings joy to others. And finally this year we will conclude this 3-year theme by exploring how sharing brings joy to God."
