

We look forward to sharing spirit-filled worship with hundreds of peacemakers as we

look for ways to grow, support, and encourage each other. Participants of all ages will have opportunities for learning and for playing in community. We hope you will join us!

IN THE WORLD

This is part of a very moving letter from our missionary, **Dan Buttry**, who is **in the Republic of Georgia** working with a group of young adults (the IGNITE team) from the US and Georgia:

"Friday was an incredible day. Because the Orthodox radicals had blocked Muslims in a village in eastern Georgia from praying and the government had done nothing in response, the religious minorities and other civil society groups decided to take to the streets for a demonstration for the right to pray. Once again, the Baptists were in the lead. There were Catholics present, Jews, Yizedis (a Kurdish monotheistic faith that traces its roots back to Ur), Pentecostals, and young folks who have left the Orthodox Church in disgust with the bigotry and violence that is being tolerated. But only the Baptist bishops (Merab, Rusudan and Ilia--Malkhaz was in the UK getting his doctorate degree from Oxford) came clearly dressed as religious leaders--each of them wearing striking purple robes. I was dressed in my black clergy robe and white Eastertide stole (the Baptists here follow the Eastern calendar). Everyone else, even as they do come to the streets shows some timidity, but the Baptist leaders courageously stand forth for religious freedom for everyone and human rights being respected for everyone.

I gave our IGNITE team members freedom to decide what to do about the invitation by the Georgian Baptists to join them in this public demonstration. Everyone eagerly wanted to do it, even though I was the only one, Georgian or U.S. American, who had ever been in a demonstration. We made signs with Rusudan and her children. Rusudan and I held up a simple sign that said, "Love your neighbor"--it's so awful that Christians are the ones disregarding the simplest and clearest teachings of Jesus.

Eventually we processed from the square where the demonstration started to the nearby Tbilisi mosque, Rusudan and me leading the way. We gathered around the mosque with our signs held up to the surrounding community as the mosque let out after prayers. Interestingly, the imam who had a strong relationship with the Baptists, felt intimidated and didn't even come out or tell the men at prayer what was happening. So I stood at the door of the mosque, greeting people with peace as they came out. Many are foreign workers from the Middle East and Africa and can speak English (more than the average Georgia), so I struck up conversations with them, telling them that we were standing in solidarity with the right of everyone, including Muslims, to pray. Once the realized what was happening, the men got very excited. One young fellow from Egypt closed out the demonstration with a beautiful speech of appreciation from what we were doing.

Our team members, especially our two Georgians Ina and Tamuna, were so proud to have stood up for what was right. They are among the religious minorities, but inspired by their leaders they joined in finding their voice and raising it clearly for justice and liberty."
