FROM RAMESH KUMAR - The Present Flood Condition in Odisha, India

Scores of villages has been devoured by swirling current of rivers like Subarnarekha, Brahmani, Baitarani, Mahanadi, Jalaka, Budhabalanga, Daya, Rusikula, Hadagoda etc. Road and rail links between flood affected districts have been badly affected due to overflowing of water in railway tracks and national Highways interlinking these districts.

As reported, the calamity is much larger than expected; this is why the required materials are not reaching their destination due to communication hindrances in the affected area. Further, the recent floods have brought untold miseries to the rural people residing in the flood affected districts. More than one lakh domestic cattle have been washed away and adding further aggravating in unhygienic conditions to these areas due to stink and filth cause by death corps laying scattered all over, posing a serious threat to the lives of human being in these areas. Cholera and dysentery are spreading in these areas. If not checked on time, it will create a serious problem.

Most of the District i.e. Balasore, Mayurbhanj, Ganjamm, Berhampur, Puri, Jagatsinghpur, Jajpur District are all coastal districts in the state of Odisha. The river passes through this district causes flood. This year Phalin and heavy rain fall washed away health and wealth of Odisha. Houses, utensils, grains and other things washed out in flood water. People are taking shelter at high embankment to save their

lives and they are facing problems of shelter, safe drinking water, medical care, food, and hygienic. 56.70 lakh people in 10 districts, as over 160 villages still remained marooned. Out of them 100 families of our institution (staffs and students) are severely affected and cut off from the outside world. These are the condition when mankind along with all living creatures surrenders to the nature and relief becomes the immediate need in the area. People are hungry without water, animals are dying due to lack of fodder and health conditions worsen creating more problems.

"Little Man, Big Gifts"

Lectionary reading for the Week: Psalm 119:137-144; Habakkuk 1:1-4, 2:1-4; **LUKE 19:1-10**; 2 Thessalonians 1:1-4, 11-12. (Focus scripture for this week is in bold.)

Zaccheus would not have been one to care about the concerns of the 90 % who served the empire; he was there to benefit from them, collecting their taxes for Rome, padding on a little extra for himself. He had great job security in working for the Empire.

But then he starts listening to this Jesus. Maybe he's been hearing about the new life that Jesus invites his listeners to enter. Maybe he is wondering about that new kingdom he's heard about. Maybe he is beginning to question the kingdom he serves, the empire. Maybe he feels that he's backed into a corner, he's had enough, he's up a tree. We don't know. We just get Luke's story in outline about this short little man who climbs up in a tree so that he can see Jesus enter Jericho.

He makes this one move to see Jesus, and his life turns upside down. Jesus sees him up there in the sycamore, and throws out a radical challenge. Jesus says he will eat with him. He will break all the political and social rules about who could eat with whom, and he will come to dine at the table of a despised collaborator, one who collects the taxes that keeps the boot of Rome on the neck of Israel.

Zaccheus responds in kind; he goes way overboard and promises from this day forward to give away half of his goods to the poor. And furthermore, he offers to make good *fourfold* on the money he has stolen from his compatriots.

And that kingdom that Zaccheus might have wondered about, that life with God? It's right here, Jesus announces, right now.

"Salvation has come to this house"--this is what the kingdom looks like, this is how it is with God. The lost, the miserable ones, up a tree like little Zaccheus, are welcomed, no matter what they've done, no matter who they are. All gather around the same dining table. The new reign of God says God cares for the least among us, cares with profligate generosity.

With this news, Zaccheus' heart breaks, it breaks right open and a new way of living breaks in. He learns how to love. (Anne Howard, "Crazy Love," 10-28-2013, beatitudessociety.org).
