MIXON MUSES

Advent is a time of preparation. Like Lent before Easter, Advent is a time to get ready for the joyous celebration of Christmas. Christmas is much more than the sights, sounds and conspicuous consumption that have come to characterize the "Holiday Season." Christmas is not that "Holiday Season." Christmas is a celebration of God coming near in the form of a human infant. It is the soul of a sacred season in which incarnation of the holy is both remembered and experienced again as a living reality. It is a time for taking stock of our own lives; it is a time to consider what it would be to have Christ born in us once again.

In the best of all possible worlds, babies don't come as a complete surprise. The birth is eagerly anticipated and the preceding days are filled with preparation for the coming child. Advent is that time of preparation for the birth of Christ. The ancient story says that the baby Jesus was born in a stable and laid in a manger. Even if Joseph had tried to phone ahead for reservations, the accommodations in first century Bethlehem would have been minimal and healthcare virtually nonexistent. The preparation for the birth of Jesus was apparently adequate, but clearly improvised. Now, all these centuries later, we need not improvise. The liturgical calendar allows us enough time to get ready for the birth as it comes around each year. We have time to prepare for the coming of Christ in this new church year.

In her beautiful Advent hymn, "People Look East," Eleanor Farjeon encourages us to "Make your house fair as you are able, Trim the hearth and set the table. People, look east and sing today: Love, the guest, is on the way." It is such a magnificent way to describe what is about to happen, "Love the guest is on the way." The King of Love is coming, is coming to your house, to your heart.

What must you do to prepare?

Every year, the Spiridons host a lovely open house during this season for the whole congregation (as did Soo Kim and Doug Lee not long ago.) Putting on a party like that takes time and energy before the guests arrive. Preparations are critical for the party to be a success.

For many years my former partner and I hosted a holiday open house for 150 people on a Sunday before Christmas. It was a joyous occasion. We loved having our home filled with family, friends and colleagues. But it took a lot to plan and prepare for the party. He would start early in December decorating the house from top to bottom, front to back, side to side. Over time I developed a menu of favorites that kept me busy in the kitchen. When the doorbell rang on the given Sunday afternoon the feast was on, but the whole thing would have been a disaster without preparation. The full affect, the desired outcome, the shared community, came into being because we spent a lot of time and energy preparing.

I know Advent preparation is not quite the same thing, but I also believe the parallel is there. The party was about joy and love – love for the people in our lives and the joy of sharing our home with them. Christmas is also about love and joy, but a deeper love and grander joy than a good party. If we put that amount of our resource into planning a party, what would be needed to prepare for the Christ, the King of Love, the Savior of the World.

I know love and joy can be spontaneous, but in the seasons of the church year, the love and joy of Christmas call for preparation. I am very excited about Advent at FBCPA this year. Led by our intern, Naomi, we have been preparing for this season for some time. Naomi, who interned this summer with Marcia McFee in her Worship Design Studio, brought creativity and grace to this process. We had a wonderful Advent to Epiphany Worship Brainstorming Party, involving 20 members of the congregation preparing for our Advent/ Christmas/Epiphany celebration. The theme for this season is drawn from the

prophet Isaiah (2:3), "Come let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of God...." There we will engage in building that house of God as a place where Christ might come and dwell with us, bringing peace and goodwill to all creation.

Starting Saturday, November 30 at 9:00 AM we will begin to build our house and make it ready by "Hanging the Greens" (decorating the sanctuary.) Then on Sunday, December 1, we will share the first of four worship services that will help us to make our hearts ready as well. Preparations are in order; love the guest is on the way.

Friends of God,

Advent may be my favorite season of the Church year. The longing, the waiting, the hope, the anticipation, I connect so deeply to the spirituality of it all. I love the music, "O Come, O Come, Emanuel" and the other ancient melodies of Western Europe feel like home to me. I wonder what melodies feel like home to you this time of year. Is it something from another place and another time like mine? Or is it something more contemporary?

What music feels like home?

Advent also challenges me. We'll hear from all four preachers this sea-

son (I'm preaching the Sunday following Thanksgiving, the First Sunday of Advent) and each sermon will have a challenge wrapped up in it somehow. The readings we chose for the season ask us to wake up. They ask us to prepare. They speak of peaceable kingdoms and the coming of the Day of The Lord. Advent is a challenging season. We're not waiting for Christmas morning in some warm fuzzy sense (though, I do love that, too). No, we're waiting for the Apocalypse, the "inbreaking" of God.

That's what "apocalypse" means, you know - "in-breaking." It means "revelation," the "aha!" of recognizing the divine.

Perhaps you have noticed a little literature around the church about how Advent is a conspiracy and the Apocalypse is something into which we are invited to participate. Mercy. Justice. Reconciliation. Jubilee. These are all apocalyptic.

This season, we're invited to be apocalyptic. We're invited to try it on, this kind of waiting that brings forth justice and peace, the kind of expectation that assumes God Is Here With Us. We are citizens of the Peaceable Kingdom.

So, as you read about the various events scheduled, the worship services, the Christmas Caroling, and the movie the kids are making, imagine these as apocalyptic practices.

We are all longing for a home. That home is the Peaceable Kingdom, the Time of God. It is a place and a people. We will sing ourselves into that home this year.

Adult Spiritual Formation in January: VISIONS OF JESUS

"Two thousand years ago, an itinerant Jewish preacher and miracle worker walked across the Galilee, gathering followers to establish what he called the 'Kingdom of God.' The revolutionary movement he launched was so threatening to the established order that he was captured, tortured, and executed as a state criminal. Within decades after his shameful death, his followers would call him God."

Please join us for our Adult Spiritual Formation hour during the month of January as we consider the topic, "Visions of Jesus." Beginning with the engaging portrait that Reza Aslan offers in his provocative new book, Zealot: The Life and Times of Jesus of Nazareth, we will consider how different views of Jesus' life and teachings point toward different understandings of what it means to be a disciple of Christ. We will examine Aslan's image of Jesus as a radical political revolutionary whose goal was to liberate his people from Roman occupation. We will also look at the cultural controversy that has arisen surrounding this Muslim religious scholar's authorship of a book about Jesus. In addition to examining Aslan's portrait of Jesus, we'll also consider our own images of Jesus, and how they shape our faith and our understanding of God. We'll also review the unique glimpse of Jesus that emerges in each of the four Gospels, giving attention to the nuances, variations, and differing emphases that characterize each biblical author's sketch of Jesus' life. Please plan to be with us for worship and stay for the second hour for conversation about how a closer consideration of the "historical Jesus" can enliven and transform Christian faith and discipleship in the twenty-first century.





DECEMBER BIRTHDAYS

FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH Council Meeting Minutes, November 14, 2013

Moderator Carolyn Shepard opened the meeting at 5:01 PM. Pastor Rick excerpted from a sermon by Doug Davidson about the transfiguration described in Mark 9, noting that transfiguration is available to each of us when we realize we see God.

Present: Jane and Jin Chin, Dan Cudworth, Marilyn Hunwick, Pastor Rick Mixon, Eleanor and Hugh Satterlee, and Moderator Carolyn Shepard.

Rick reported that Patrice Heath is not doing well and that Bob Towner's situation is stable, but with a poor prognosis.

The Interfaith Thanksgiving service will be held in our church on Tuesday, November 26th at 7:30 PM followed by a potluck dessert in the Fellowship Hall.

Jin reviewed the distributed treasurer's report, noting that pledge income is about \$1,000 below the prorated budget, withdrawal from Special Funds is \$15,000 less than budget, and tenant contributions is almost \$10,000 ahead of budget. Expenses to date are about \$16,500 below budget at this point in the year. Jin distributed a page of General Information from the duties of our church treasurer.

Jane reported several small items: Oleta is negotiating with the PACCC about where and how to relocate theirs and our refuse containers to facilitate parents dropping off and retrieving their children and also providing cosmetic improvement.

Recent recommendations from an arborist are that the Ginko tree in front of the church be removed as being ill-placed in the shade of a neighboring maple tree, the Oak tree on NITC property be trimmed back to reduce danger to the church roof and the clogging of downspouts on the back of the church. The estimated expense of \$3,900 was approved by the Council.

Buried drain lines from downspouts have filled with roots over time and required rooting out. This work was accomplished in conjunction with the patio project to preclude difficulties later. The approximately \$1,200 cost for this was also approved.

The Eucalyptus tree in front of the fellowship hall was pronounced dead and has been removed at an expense of \$2,040.

Confusion on the part of the County Assessor about the tax exempt status of the Peninsula Peace and Justice Center, resulting in a tax bill to the church, is being resolved. Taxes paid will be refunded when the tax status of the PPJC is clarified.

Investment of \$30,000, 10%, of the funds yielded by sale of the Annex, in microfinance was discussed. It was decided to ask Ron Tuttle, Special Funds Treasurer, to consult with Andy Loving, a stock broker knowledgeable about such investments and other ethical investment instruments, to develop a path for our investment. The result will be approved by the Council before proceeding.

Plans for January when Rick is on Sabbatical were discussed. Rick will be present the first week and Pastor Tripp will be in charge the following three Sundays. Salaries will have to be adjusted as last year. Hugh moved and Marilyn seconded that projected pay rates for 2014 be used. The Council agreed.

The streamlined proposal to improve the church sound system has been reviewed and approved by Chip Clark, Hugh and Rick. The Council agreed to a motion by Eleanor to proceed. The \$16,000 cost will be covered by "investment profit" accumulated in the Lucile Lundquist Fund. The contractor will purchase the equipment when funds are made available to him, assemble the equipment off site, and install it over a weekend.

The patio project is proceeding well and is about half finished.

Task Teams: Congregational Life – Hospitality time after Sunday services are covered through December. Plans are underway to increase contacts with members not able to attend church regularly.

Mission: -- Funds to help with flood relief in Orissa (India) have been provided by returning the mission offering of \$1,600 from the Balasore Technical School which has been provided to our church for mission activities here, along with a donation of \$570 (\$300 from budget Discretionary and from \$270 from individual gifts). Nominating Committee: Eleanor asked for help identifying new members for the committee and for the various jobs in the church.

The next Council meeting will occur on Thursday, December 12th, at 5:00 PM. The following meeting is planned for January 9, 2014, and the Annual Meeting for February 2, 2014, following the Sunday service.

Carolyn closed the meeting at 7:23 PM with a short prayer asking especially for comfort and care for our very ill members, and for comfort and relief for storm victims in the Philippines.
